Bring Us, O Lord God is one of two choral anthems by William H. Harris (1883-1973) set for double choir and popularly sung on the occasion of All Saints'. Harris was organist at St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, and this very anthem was sung at the late Queen Elizabeth II's commital service held there. The text was penned by John Donne (1572-1631), who served as Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, London.

A READING FROM THE EPISTLE OF ST. PAUL TO THE EPHESIANS.

In Christ we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who works all things according to the counsel of his will, 12so that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory. ¹⁵For this reason, because I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, ¹⁶I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, ¹⁷that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him, 18 having the eyes of your hearts enlightened, that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, ¹⁹ and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power toward us who believe, according to the working of his great might 20 that he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, 21 far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. ²²And he put all things under his feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all. MAGNIFICAT Arvo Pärt

Though the settings of tonight's Evening Canticles were never meant to be paired, they compliment each other quite well in musical style and atmosphere. Both settings are also in Latin, which is a deviation from the English settings normally sung for Evensong. Estonian composer Arvo Pärt (b. 1935) is well known in today's musical world, primarily for his musical innovation of tintinnabulation. The technique may either involve the application of various inversions of the same chord, or in other instances, certain voices sing the notes of a triad while other voices move in a stepwise fashion. The device is meant to evoke the pealing of bells, and is heard throughout Pärt's setting of the *Magnificat*. Gregorian chant as well as the music of the Russian Orthodox Church, of which Pärt is a member, also heavily influence his compositional style, and these elements are evident in the music.

Gustav Holst (1874-1934) is most known for his orchestral suite *The Planets*. The unaccompanied *Nunc dimittis* was composed in 1915 and remained in manuscript form until 1979 when a published edition appeared, revised by the composer's daughter, Imogen Holst. Gustav Holst was passionate about the music of Byrd and Palestrina, which is shown here in both its modal writing, and the way the upper and lower voices of the choir answer each other antiphonally. It is an exuberant setting of the Song of Simeon.

Malcolm Boyle (1902-1976) received his early musical training at Eton College as a chorister and St. George's, Windsor Castle as an organ student. He later returned to St. George's as assistant organist to Sir Henry Walford Davies. Boyle's lasting musical accomplishment is his anthem, *Thou, O God, Art Praised in Sion*, noted for its grand organ introduction and extensive choral writing, reminiscent of the large-scale choral works composed by C. Hubert H. Parry. Our Cathedral Choir will sing in residence at St. George's, Windsor in July 2026.
